

**THE REGULAR MEETING
OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BENSON, ARIZONA
HELD JUNE 10, 2013, AT 7:00 P.M.
AT CITY HALL, 120 W. 6TH STREET, BENSON, ARIZONA**

CALL TO ORDER:

Mayor King called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL:

Present were: Mayor Toney D. King, Sr., Vice Mayor Lori McGoffin, Councilmembers Ron Brooks, David Lambert, Nick Maldonado, Chris Moncada and Al Sacco.

EMPLOYEE RECOGNITION: None.

PROCLAMATION:

Mayor King read a proclamation declaring the month of August as "Drowning Impact Awareness Month." Mayor King then presented the proclamation to Recreation Coordinator Laura Parkin.

PUBLIC HEARING: None

CALL TO THE PUBLIC:

Steve Sacco addressed Council stating it was common knowledge members of staff and Council are circulating recall petitions pertaining to alleged wrongdoings by Councilmember Ron Brooks. Mr. Sacco stated while the allegations are unsubstantiated, what bothers him is the cavalier way some employees and Councilmembers have ignored their oath, the employee handbook and Arizona law, adding these staff members and Councilmembers were observed circulating petitions while wearing City logo attire and according to the employee handbook, that is a prohibited activity. Mr. Sacco then stated when the issues were brought to the Acting City Manager's attention that City Councilmembers were guilty not only of violating the employee handbook, but also State law, his response was that City Councilmembers were not employees. Mr. Sacco then disagreed stating Councilmembers receive a paycheck with taxes withheld, have a city assigned employee number, receive a W2 and are covered by City's workers compensation insurance, adding under A.R.S. §38-701, paragraph 2, an employee is defined as any person in the employ of this state or a political subdivision of this state and includes any elective or appointed officer of this state or an eligible political subdivision of this state, with political subdivision further defined as an incorporated city. Mr. Sacco then stated the City Councilmember employee classification was further confirmed by the current president of the League of Arizona Cities & Towns. Mr. Sacco then stated Councilmember Moncada should not be on the committee that will be selecting his father's supervisor, which is against conflict of interest laws. Mr. Sacco then stated it should be obvious that the citizens of Benson are tired of the backdoor shenanigans like the ones that are occurring right now and what he doesn't understand is why these issues are being ignored and allowed to continue. Mr. Sacco then stated it is his advice to out-going Councilmembers to stop their recall activities and slip quietly into political retirement, adding as for the Acting City Manager, he recommends he does his own research and not rely on the legal opinion of others in making decisions. Mr. Sacco then stated it is his opinion that the offending Councilmembers be asked to step down immediately and that any participation in the budget process by Mr. Moncada should be reversed or disregarded.

Peter Wangsness addressed Council stating he wanted to file a complaint about the behavior of Michelle Johnson as it relates to the memorandum that was included in the Council packet, adding the reprehensible behavior found in the memo is clearly intended to attack a Councilmember through speculation and we

need to stop this type of inter-office behavior, if we ever wish to work together. Mr. Wangsness then stated he was subject to these types of back-handed attacks when he was at the University of Arizona and he feels it is beneath the dignity of the City of Benson and it does nothing but fester and poison the relationships among us, adding it doesn't look well to other cities. Mr. Wangsness then stated the memo relates to Mr. Jason Miller being placed on a consent agenda to be approved to the Board of Adjustment, and proceeded to dissect the memo, stating the first four statements are the only objective statements in the memo and the tone of the rest of the memo is an attack, with pure speculation on Ms. Johnson's part as to Mr. Miller's mindset and Mr. Brooks motive. Mr. Wangsness then stated there should be a public reprimand as this document has become public.

Sharon Sacco stated she would like to voice her opinion on Councilmember Lambert showing up at Wal-Mart at their grand opening with a petition to recall Councilmember Brooks, adding she thinks it was the most disrespectful thing Councilmember Lambert could have done, noting it was disrespectful to the City of Benson, to Wal-Mart and to the businesses in the City. Ms. Sacco then stated she had done nothing but talk highly of Councilmember Lambert and when she heard about this and when she heard the Mayor knew about it and did nothing to stop it, she was disappointed. Ms. Sacco then stated she felt Councilmember Lambert owed both Wal-Mart and the City an apology.

Kathy Suagee addressed Council concerning the out-going Councilmembers and their activities. Ms. Suagee urged Mayor King to cancel all meetings, including the City Manager search committee, until the new Councilmembers can take their seats. Ms. Suagee's comments will be retained with the Council packet.

Tom Fitzgerald addressed Council stating he was premature with making statements about an event that occurred on Saturday, but he will have more information that will be relevant to provide to everyone about that event later.

J.T. Moffett addressed Council stating he wasn't going to add much to what was said, adding those before him had said quite a bit that made a lot of sense and it was well-spoken. Mr. Moffett then stated he wanted to talk about the senior center, adding the building was given to the City by a grant in the year 2000. Mr. Moffett then stated Leisa Cotton helped write that grant and has been working tirelessly for our seniors for many years, adding the senior population is an essential part of and are vital to the community. Mr. Moffett then stated he lost his parents and grandparents, adding he doesn't have anyone like that in his life since his wife also lost her elder family as well, but he has adopted many of the seniors in this community and he looks out for quite a few of them. Mr. Moffett then stated he would like to see the City have an Adopt-a-Senior program, whether it be the City or by a committee, adding we need to start the program. Mr. Moffett then stated we are not doing enough for the seniors or the youth of this community right now and we need to seriously look at that, adding he is not going to stop talking about it and having forums about it until we do. Mr. Moffett then stated seniors are a large part of our population and many are on fixed incomes with family that can't afford to take care of them and many with no one to look after them. Mr. Moffett then stated we're down 125 senior meals a week since 2000 and he wants to see the City start helping to put out more meals and having more activities, citing Yuma as a great example. Mr. Moffett then stated he knows the City of Benson isn't the same as Yuma, but we can still do things on a smaller scale and can start ministering to our senior citizens of the community. Mr. Moffett then stated the City gives \$500 to the Shop with a Cop program and he just heard the City is not going to pay \$800 for the golf carts for the senior meal benefit. Mr. Moffett then asked Mayor King and the Council to put some pressure on City Hall to pay for these golf carts, adding he knows the City pays the utility bills for the meals program, and he appreciates it, but he feels there is no limit to what the City can do for the senior citizens in this community, adding \$800 is just a drop in the bucket, once again asking the Mayor and Council to put pressure on City Hall to pay for the golf carts for the senior benefit golf tournament.

Jeff Cook addressed City Council stating he didn't come prepared, but he knew Little Caesar's was going to be on the agenda, adding he needed to talk to a few people to find out what the other side of the story was. Mr. Cook then stated he didn't know what the Council's plans were, but he knew Little Caesar's

wanted them to pay him a lot of money for what appears to be a problem he probably created for himself. Mr. Cook then stated he remembered Mr. Rose's first appearance before Council where he probably spent 2 minutes telling them about things that mattered and over an hour giving them defamation statements about Staff, adding he was horrified to see that. Mr. Cook then stated if it had been the other way around, with over an hour of things that mattered and 2 minutes of defamation, he could let that go and actually would have, if he hadn't spoken to Jim Cox. Mr. Cook then stated he understood Mr. Rose's claim has been denied. Mr. Cook then stated 2 months ago on April 11, Mr. Rose was asked to submit photos to the City Clerk so they could be sent to the insurance company and was also told at that time, this didn't constitute filing a claim. Mr. Cook then stated since then, he had spoken to Jim Cox because he wanted to know why was Mr. Rose's claim was denied and Mr. Cox told him on April 12, that Mr. Cox had a meeting with Mr. Rose and the reason for the meeting was to go over the claim form and the procedure to file a claim so Mr. Rose would know what he needed to do, how to do it and who to do it with. Mr. Cook then stated on April 13, Mr. Rose was given an email with written instructions on the procedure for filing a claim, adding on that same day, the insurance company contacted Mr. Rose and went over with him the procedure for filing a claim. Mr. Cook then stated on April 20, Mr. Rose got a follow up call and an email on how to file a claim, why and who to file it with, adding he doesn't feel the least bit sorry for Mr. Rose since it seems that his was an actual refusal to file a claim until after the passing of the deadline to file the claim and it appears that the refusal to file a claim shows the claim is invalid, otherwise he would have filed it when he could have had it ruled on by the insurance company. Mr. Cook then stated it also appears it was designed to give the impression that Mr. Rose is a victim of the City and this would give him and his political allies a political advantage and we should be outraged. Mr. Cook then stated he is intensely interested in how this current Council and how the next City Council will or will not offer a settlement based on a claim that has already been denied.

Mayor King stated he would like to respond to some comments made during the Call to the Public, stating he has already discussed the Adopt-a-Senior program with Mr. Cox and the City will be advertising the program on the utility bills, so everyone will be aware such a program exists. Mayor King then stated when he saw Councilmember Lambert with the recall petitions, Councilmember Lambert was already on the way to his vehicle, adding he didn't see Councilmember Lambert until after the grand opening at Wal-Mart. Mayor King then stated with all the accusations of wrong-doing, he would like to direct Staff to move forward with having an outside agency look into the accusations, adding he has already spoken to Mr. Cox about this issue and he would like it to move forward. Councilmember Brooks then stated he would like to direct the Interim City Manager to put discussion and possible action for the Senior Meals Program on a future Council meeting agenda.

Acting Interim City Manager Jim Cox reminded everyone to check the ADOT project closures at www.adot.gov for more information. Mayor King stated the dive-in movies are a great activity for kids and families. Councilmember Maldonado noted the City had to turn people away from the last dive-in movie reminding those who were going to attend to get there early. Recreation Coordinator stated people could also watch the movie from the adjoining park.

Item 1f had been removed from the Consent Agenda by the Amended Agenda. Vice Mayor McGoffin moved to approve the Consent Agenda. Seconded by Councilmember Moncada. City Clerk Vicki Vivian stated she was passing out amended minutes from the May 13, 2013 Regular Meeting, with the following change, " Paul Lotsof addressed Council regarding the terms of Councilmembers and stated **according to a published report**, the new Council will be seated in early July but he doesn't think that is correct." Vice Mayor McGoffin then amended her motion to approve the Consent Agenda with the amended minutes for the May 13, 2013 Regular Meeting. Amended motion seconded by Councilmember Moncada. Motion passed 6-1 with Councilmember Lambert voting nay.

2. Discussion and possible action regarding Little Caesar's claim against the City of Benson

Interim City Manager Jim Cox stated at the Call to the Public, Mr. Cook explained the process we followed in encouraging Mr. Rose to file a claim with the City's insurance company, adding everything was processed absolutely as quickly as we could. Mr. Cox then stated when Mr. Rose did file a claim on May 30, we had an adjudication from our insurance company by June 6 and it was now up to Council, adding Staff is seeking direction from Council. Councilmember Moncada stated he would be abstaining due to a conflict of interest. Vice Mayor McGoffin stated she hasn't been very vocal on this issue, but from the beginning, she felt someone should have contacted the business owner and told him if there were any problems, he should let us know and we would figure it out. Vice Mayor McGoffin stated everything is just a convoluted mess, because she doesn't feel anything can be proven and if the City would have handled it back in December the way it should have been, all of this mess would never have gotten to where it is. Vice Mayor McGoffin then stated she personally feels the City should settle with Little Caesar's in any way that we can, adding she doesn't know if we can give them a settlement or can give him credits on his utility bills towards his claim, but she does know at one point the City settled with the SKP park on a water

issue; she doesn't remember how the settlement was done. Mr. Cox stated the settlement with SKP was done before he started with the City, but he does know the SKP park received a credit to use toward their monthly bills. Vice Mayor McGoffin then stated if the City does settle this issue with Mr. Rose, we need something signed to make sure the claim ends. Councilmember Maldonado stated he felt like the issue should be tabled until the new Council could be seated and they could address the situation. Councilmember Sacco asked if Mr. Rose filed a claim with his own insurance company, adding in one report he read, the issue was the City's fault and in another report he read, it was no one's fault and yet in a third report he read, it was the business' fault so he felt the Council should let the insurance companies fight it out. Councilmember Lambert stated the Council had received an opinion from the City Attorney and he agreed with tabling the issue, but not so the new Council to make a decision, but because he believes the Council should get more information on what happened with the SKP park so Council would know what their options are if they decide to offer a settlement and give Mr. Rose a credit toward his utility bill. Councilmember Brooks stated he has seen this from the beginning and was hoping it would not become a big ordeal adding he made suggestions early on in this investigation to have an oil sample taken right at the ovens immediately, but it was never done until almost 2 months later and the tests that were done were not done by forensic people. Councilmember Brooks then stated when a test is to be conducted; it should be done by the analytical lab, not by people who are not qualified. Councilmember Brooks then stated the way he sees it right now, he really doesn't know if it was the plumber's oil in there or the City's oil, but the first mistake the City made was not owning up to the error in the first place and the second mistake the City made was the way we went about investigating what actually happened, adding at this point, he doesn't know if Council will ever know what happened, but his feeling is that the City Council ought to pay Mr. Rose because we can't afford not to. Councilmember Brooks then stated as a City, we need to do the right thing for all of our customers and all who live in the City, adding if we make mistakes, we need to pay up on it. Councilmember Brooks then stated he doesn't like giving the public's money away, but this is not a gift. Councilmember Brooks then stated he read the original report from the gas company and the bottom line is there was no test done by them, adding the second test was not done with forensic rags, but was done with rags used by the City. Councilmember Brooks then stated he sees too many mistakes the City made and he thinks that we're at fault regardless, so he doesn't see how the City cannot pay Mr. Rose, adding he should be paid and the City should move on. Vice Mayor McGoffin stated she would like to ask Mr. Rose a question. Mr. Rose then stated he would like to address the Council, stating he recommended the City use what is called a mouse when they cleaned the gas lines, but instead they used rags and after that was done, his technicians found cloth fibers in the oven filters and with more recent problems, found even more cloth fibers. Mr. Rose then stated it is now June, 2013 and all of this occurred in December, 2012, adding he pays his taxes every month to the City of Benson. Vice Mayor McGoffin then asked Mr. Rose if he would be ok with a utility credit to use toward his utility bills with Mr. Rose stating the amount he asked for doesn't even cover all the expenses related to his claim, so he would just prefer a check. Vice Mayor McGoffin moved to cut Mr. Rose a check for the amount that he submitted. Seconded by Councilmember Brooks. Councilmember Brooks then stated he would like to say again, because of the way this was done, he doesn't feel anyone is going to be able to prove who was at fault, but our best interest is to show this town and the investors out there, that the City will take care of them even if we don't know it was our mistake. Councilmember Brooks then stated he does that in his own business because he knows that if he doesn't take care of a customer, he will lose business and he can't afford that. Councilmember Sacco then stated he feels due to the circumstances and the conflicting reports he got, the City is in a very gray area here, so he would recommend paying Mr. Rose. Motion then passed 5-1 with Councilmember Lambert voting nay and Councilmember Moncada abstaining.

3. **Appointment of the Chairman of the City of Benson Economic Development Subcommittee (EDSC)**

Vice Mayor McGoffin stated she had been named the chairman of the EDSC when the previous chairman, Councilmember John Lodzinski passed away. Vice Mayor McGoffin then stated at the last EDSC meeting, the subcommittee recommended Member Chris Moncada be appointed the new chairman. Vice Mayor McGoffin then moved to go with the subcommittee's choice to appoint Councilmember Moncada the chairman of the EDSC. Seconded by Councilmember Lambert. After no further discussion, motion passed 5-2 with Councilmembers Brooks and Sacco voting nay.

4. **Discussion and possible action in the creation of a Non-Exempt Seasonal Part-Time Pool Cashier position in Recreation**

Mayor King asked for the HR Coordinator Melissa Quiroz to address Council concerning this item. Ms. Quiroz then stated Mayor King had received questions about creating a new position, stating the City usually hires 6 lifeguards, but this year only had 5 qualified applicants, noting the sixth person interviewed great and has certification in First Aid, but is not certified to be a lifeguard, so they would like to create the position of a part-time Pool Cashier for 25 hours a week at \$7.80/hour, adding the position will be seasonal. Ms. Quiroz then stated instead of hiring the normal 6 lifeguards, the Recreation Department would be hiring 5 lifeguards and the Pool Cashier. Mayor King noted the City would actually be saving money because we would not be hiring a sixth lifeguard at a higher rate of pay. Ms. Quiroz confirmed this adding a sixth lifeguard would also be working more than 25 hours a week. Mayor King then stated this would also enable the lifeguards to stay completely focused on the swimmers' safety and their lifeguarding duties, instead of having to collect money and handle First Aid issues. Mayor King felt it was important to note the City was simply replacing a lifeguard with a cashier and was not hiring extra personnel. Councilmember Brooks then asked about pool hours with Recreation Coordinator Laura Parkin stating the pool is open Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. for general swim with swimming lessons at 9:50 a.m., there are adult swim mornings and evenings as well as on Saturdays and the pool is open on Sundays from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Councilmember Brooks then asked about lifeguard coverage with Ms. Parkin stating the lifeguard to patron ratio is 22, so for every 22 swimmers, the City has to have 1 lifeguard, adding the average number of patrons is 100-130 each day, noting if there are 45 people in the pool and only have 3 lifeguards on duty, we cannot open the child pool, because we are required by our insurance company to have lifeguards on duty at all times in both pools. Councilmember Brooks asked about the cashier's duties with Ms. Parkin stating the cashier will do a lot of administrative work, such as swimming lesson registrations, taking money, filling out paperwork, First Aid, etc. Councilmember Brooks then asked if on normal days, the City had just 1 lifeguard taking care of people with Ms. Parkin stating the City can't open the pool with 1 lifeguard. Vice Mayor McGoffin then stated this will save the City money by hiring a cashier to do administrative duties instead of hiring a sixth lifeguard. Councilmember Brooks then stated he had heard some people just drop their children off at the pool and asked if it was a problem with Ms. Parkin stating it's not really a big problem, adding the City is not responsible for who drops off and picks up children; our only responsibility is lifeguarding. Vice Mayor McGoffin moved to create a non-exempt seasonal part-time pool cashier position in recreation. Seconded by Councilmember Moncada. Motion passed 7-0.

5. **Resolution 18-2013 of the Mayor and Council of the City of Benson, Arizona, approving a Construction Agreement with L.B. Foster Company for installation of ADA-compliant restrooms at Lions Park, pursuant to CDBG Grant #107-13**

Public Works Director Brad Hamilton stated Council approved this project back in April, 2012 with the City replacing the main bathroom across from the big ramada and a second bathroom at the softball field. Mr. Hamilton then stated as part of the CDBG project, the City has cleared the environmental review and got to the bidding stages, with 2 responsive bidders, adding L.B. Foster was lowest bid by about \$18,000. Vice Mayor McGoffin noted if the City didn't spend the CDBG money, we would lose it and the park bathrooms would now be ADA compliant, which was very important. Mr. Hamilton agreed, stating the City went ahead with the purchase and installation of 2 bathrooms knowing the City would need to contribute approximately \$30,000, but the grant funding was paying for most of the cost. Mr. Hamilton then stated with federal funding, the City must go with the lowest qualified bidder. Councilmember Moncada made a motion to approve Resolution 18-2013. Seconded by Councilmember Lambert. Motion passed 6-1 with Councilmember Brooks voting nay.

6. **Review of City Finances with emphasis on April, 2013 financial results, the City's financial position at April 30, 2013 and discussion of expected future net revenue streams**

Finance Director Megan Moreno addressed Council with the financial highlights for the month of April, stating the City's unrestricted cash is \$1.6 million and the City's bond proceeds are \$1.4 million, adding in May, we will see that amount decrease since we did just do our fourth bond draw for some projects completed around the City. Ms. Moreno then noted the City has been spending more than incoming revenues, with the fund balance for the month being down \$37,000. Ms. Moreno then stated Citywide revenues are \$823,000, which is higher than April of 2012 and personnel is at \$412,000, also up from 2012. Ms. Moreno then reviewed the General Fund stating revenues are on target with budgeted numbers and personnel was up a little in April, due to a large payout for vacation and sick time for a retirement, adding expenditures exceeded revenues by \$31,000 mainly due to the large retirement payment.

Ms. Moreno then reviewed the Enterprise Funds beginning with the Gas Fund stating it was down for the month of April, noting the volume has decreased due to weather. Ms. Moreno then stated the Water Fund is doing well and is showing a positive fund balance for the month as well as for the year, but the Wastewater Fund was down for the month, due to a few unusual expenditures. Ms. Moreno then stated she has added the Sanitation Fund to the presentation and for the first time this year, the City has seen a positive fund balance in Sanitation, which is due to the adjusted billing from Southwest Disposal. Ms. Moreno then stated the Golf Course operations had a positive month in April, noting that does include the \$25,000 contribution from Mr. Hartley, but the Food and Beverage side showed a loss of \$4,000 for April.

Ms. Moreno then reviewed sales tax stating for the last 3 months, City retail sales tax are below last year's numbers and last year we continued to decline through the end of the fiscal year, adding she is projecting this current decrease will continue the current fiscal year. Ms. Moreno then stated the City saw a huge increase in our bed taxes for April, but it was simply due to back-tax payments being paid; noting this is very unusual and we will not see this continue. Ms. Moreno noted there isn't much in construction sales tax, adding for the City's total sales tax collections, we are below where we were the last two years. Ms. Moreno then noted the State sales tax collection is looking good, adding it's very predictable and is about the same level as last year.

Mayor King stated his concern was that the City was starting to see a trend and with Council getting ready to pass a new budget, he thinks we need to direct Staff to take a good look at this and see if there's anything Council needs to look at cutting from the budget, adding if this trend continues, there could be problems. Interim City Manager Jim Cox stated the proposed budget did take lower sales tax collections into account, but Staff can review it again in light of the April and May financial results and if there is something they aren't comfortable with, they will come back to Council with suggestions. Mayor King then stated the Council needed to be fiscally responsible. Councilmember Brooks then stated when things are tight, hunkering down is sometimes the best answer, but if we don't get business into this town, it's going to die and he would like to see that we allocate some money to try and do some outreach and get some revenue into this town.
